Library Science - Aide

Elective
10 credits 5 each semester
Recommended Prerequisite(s)
Course Description:

As a library aide, the student will learn the basic processes of library circulation including check-in, check out, shelving books, hanging newspapers, preparing new books and library materials for check-out, and periodical and vertical file maintenance. Other duties include creating bulletin boards, bookmarks, signs, and promotional materials. A library aide should be willing and able to learn and understand the Dewey Decimal system, assist students and teachers in finding materials, be able to type and process general computer skills. There will be times where maintaining the desk will be necessary and occasions requiring answering the phone, as well as video-recording television programs. A library aide should be pleasant, friendly, cooperative, dependable, courteous, self-directed, trustworthy, and respect the rules of the library.

Physical Education/Weight Training

Physical Education Elective
10 credits 5 each semester
Recommended Prerequisite(s) Physical Education 9
Course Description:

Weight training is both an introduction to weight training and can be an advanced class for certain students that have been in it before. In weight training the students will learn the proper way to begin and keep up with workouts. Proper form and technique will be stressed throughout the class. Each student will be instructed on ways to achieve their individual goals in terms of weight training, whether that would be to gain or lose weight or to move into power lifting or just lift as a recreational and lifetime sport.

Physical Education/9th-10th grade

Physical Education Requirement
10 credits 5 each semester
Recommended Prerequisite(s) none
Course Description:

This class of physical education will go farther into sports and activities and deal with such issues as rules, regulations and history. Students will learn more complex motor skills and how to apply them to different sports/activities. Some areas that will be covered are: Football, Basketball, Wrestling, Baseball, Track, Badminton, Hockey, Archery and so on. This class will be used to teach students skills that they may need throughout their lives.

School to Work-12th grade

Elective
10 credits 5 each semester
Prerequisite(s)
Course Description:

School-to-Work is a program to help students make a successful transition from high school to adult life through school-based learning, work-based learning, and connecting activities. Emphasis will be on learning the skills it takes to compete in the future world of work. Students may be required to work or

shadow outside the scope of a family business. Students with enough graduation credits have the opportunity to work off campus for part or all of the afternoon. Talk with the School-to-Work instructor for further information about work experience requirements.

Spanish I

World Language Elective
10 credit 5 each semester
Recommended Prerequisite(s)
Course Description:

Students learn preliminaries of the Spanish language--mostly vocabulary. Learn basic verbs and how to conjugate in present tense as well as present progressive (ing.) Work with beginning grammar, masculine/feminine nouns and agreement of adjectives and nouns are stressed and also placement of adjectives. In the spring a big project is the development of a house plan--their "dream house." The students select pictures from catalogues to "decorate" each room, labeling and describing each room and its contents in Spanish and English.

Spanish II

World Language Elective
10 credit 5 each semester
Recommended Prerequisite(s) Spanish I
Course Description:

This class will reinforce concepts and vocabulary from Spanish I. Continue to develop vocabulary. Learn preterite (past), commands, and subjunctive tenses as well as stem-changing verbs. Begin reading books written in Spanish to supplement verb tenses. Books include "La Hija de la Gran Serpiente Marina" and a biography of Roberto Clemente. Other supplements include reading newspapers written in Spanish and answering questions about the news and advertisements. The students are encouraged to begin developing their speaking skills. Culture is stressed at this level also... meaning cooking Mexican or Spanish food! Final project -- students write a children's book.

Spanish III

World Language Elective
10 credit 5 each semester
Recommended Prerequisite(s) Spanish I, Spanish II
Course Description:

Spanish III builds on the grammar and verbs taught in Spanish I and II. This course involves more Spanish literature - more reading USING the grammar. The emphasis is on allowing the student to grow in fluency and vocabulary.
