Athletics

Remember that all athletes must have a parent permission slip signed and a physical completed before they can participate. Parents are also encouraged to check their health insurance policies to determine if their policy covers interscholastic athletics. A very reasonable insurance policy is available through the school for those who need insurance.

Junior high sports will begin after

school starts. Junior high practices will be held after school. Junior high athletes also need a physical and a signed permission slip before participating.

New Faces

Our Social Science department has been completely revamped. We now have Mr. Dave Chatelain and Ms. Cortney White filling the positions. They have been working diligently this summer to prepare our social science curriculum to meet the Nebraska standards that will be required shortly. Mr. Chatelain and wife, Kathi, are moving from Hyannis where he taught last year. Ms. White has been busy tending to the Box Butte County fair, after receiving her degree recently. They will be sharing the load in Social Science our department. Mr. Chatelain will also take on the responsibility of head girls basketball coach.

The new mother who is joining our staff is Mrs. Ann Chesley. She will head up the Music department and has already started with her students, learning about 8 to 5 marching as they prepare for the Box Butte County Fair parade.

Our English department will also see a new face, Patrick Robinson, who will be teaching the 10th through 12th grade English. Joining us from eastern Nebraska. Mr. Robinson will start early also as he will assist the football program. We hope you will help us make them feel at home with some hometown hospitality.

School Lunch Program

Breakfast is served at 7:45 AM each morning, with hot meals being served 3 times a week. Breakfast is a great way to get the mind ready for learning. Both breakfasts and lunches qualify for free and reduced price meals. Grades 5 through 12 get 5 choices for lunches, a Main Entrée meal, or Alternative meal, or Chef salad meal, or yogurt tray or cold sandwich. If you are in 2nd Grade through 4th Grade you still get to choose from 3 great meals -- Main Entrée or salad or cold sandwich with the tray. Parents can join their students for lunch, but please call the school and inform them so that enough food can be prepared.

The Hemingford School District will continue to provide great start breakfasts and hot nutritious lunches to students through the National School Lunch Program. The school district requires meals to be paid for in advance. Breakfasts prices for meals are \$1.00 for grades K-12, and \$1.25 for adults. Lunch prices for meals are \$1.40 for grades K-6, \$1.70 for grades 7-12, \$2.50 for adults and \$.20 for afternoon milk. Parents are always welcome to enjoy our hot lunch program with their students, but advance notice is always needed so that enough food is prepared.

Applications for free and reduced price meals will be sent home with students on the first day of school. You must file for free or reduced meals each year. Students who were on free and reduced lunches last year have until September 15th to reapply and can still receive free or reduced meals until September 15th. New applications should be returned as soon as possible as the free or reduced meals begin the day you submit it. However applications may be submitted anytime during the school year if your income changes.

Parents will have until September 15th to put money into their family account. If you wish to have your children in separate accounts, you must inform Alta before school begins. Parents may establish accounts before school begins by contacting Alta Wright in the Administration office.

As always our policy is no charging. We always try to assist the students where possible, but we must have parent's cooperation also. We expect you to have a positive balance in your account before participating in the Hot Lunch program.

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Physcials

All Kindergarten, Seventh students. grade and students who transfer from another state must have a physical exam done before school begins. Athletic participants must also have а physical before participating in the sport. In addition, all Kindergarten students must have an eye exam. Forms for the physical and eye exams are available in the school offices. Please contact us with any questions about physicals or immunizations.

Immunizations

Students entering school for the first time (K or 1st Grade) or students entering 7th Grade or transfer students from outside the State of Nebraska, regardless of grade (includes any foreign students) are required to have the following immunizations:

3 doses of Polio vaccine,

2 doses of MMR vaccine, given on or after 12 months of age and separated by at least one month,

3 doses of pediatric Hepatitis B vaccine **or 2 doses** of adolescent vaccine if student is 11-15 years of age.

1 dose of varicella (chickenpox) if given on or after 12 months of age and prior to 13 years of age. If given at over 13 years of age, 2 doses of varicella, separated by at least one month. Written documentation (including year) of varicella disease from parent, guardian, or health care provider will be accepted.

(For the 2006-2007 school year this includes students in grades kindergarten, 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , 7^{th} , 8^{th} , and 9^{th} , plus all out of state transfer students).

All students not listed above in grades 1 through 6 and 8 through 12 are required to have the following immunizations:

3 doses of DTaP, DTP, DT, or Td vaccine, one given on or after the 4th birthday,

3 doses of polio vaccine

2 doses of MMR vaccine, given on or after 12 months of age and separated by at least one month,

3 doses of pediatric Hepatitis B vaccine or 2 doses of adolescent vaccine if student is 11-15 years of age. **Varicella is not required.**

(Varicella is required for kindergartners, 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , 7^{th} , 8^{th} , & 9^{th} graders for the 2006-2007 school year)

Child Find

Public laws 94-142 and Rules 51 and 54 mandate a free appropriate public education is available for each handicapped child ages 0-21. Asbestos Notification

The Hemingford Public Schools are on schedule complying with in AHERA (Asbestos Haz-Emergency Reard sponse Act). All school buildings have been inspected by certified inspectors for asbestos containing materials. Some asbestos containing materials were identified in the High School tiled floor. However the

material was found to be well covered and in good condition. The elementary building and central office building are free of asbestos.

A Management Plan has been developed and submitted to the Nebraska Department of Health. It outlines in detail the methods to be used to maintain the materials in a safe manner. Three year reinspections are being conducted by a certified inspector. Hemingford School maintenance staff have been trained to remove and repair any small portions of damaged ACM.

A copy of the Management Plan is on file for the public's review at the Superintendent's Office.

Student Fees

The Board of Education adopted a student fee policy and will reviewed it during the regular August board meeting. It defines what fees, materials. special clothing and equipment students may be required to furnish or supply to participate in extra-curricular activities. It also covers

non-specialized equipment or clothing that may be required of those students in certain curricular classes. Students who meet the income guidelines of the Federal Hot Lunch Program for free and reduced price meals may be eligible for a waiver of those fees, equipment or clothing. If

your family meets the guidelines of the school lunch program, and the parent is interested in obtaining a waiver for specialized equipment for sports or activities, please contact the Office of the Superintendent for an application. The complete policy with waiver applications is published in the student

Staff Qualification Notice

The No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) of 2001 gives parents the right to get information about the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teachers. Upon request, Hemingford Schools will provide the following information about their child's classroom teacher:

1. Whether the teacher has met and state qualifications licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.


- 2. Whether the teacher is teaching under an emergency or provisional teaching certificate.
- 3. The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher. You may also get information about other graduate certification or degrees held by the teacher and the field of discipline of the certification degree.

We will also, upon request, tell parents whether their child is being provided services by

a paraeducator and, if so, the of qualifications the paraeducator. The request for information should be made to an administrator in your child's school building. The information will be provided to you in a timely manner. Finally, Hemingford Public Schools will give timely notice to you if your child has been assigned, or has been taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks, by а teacher who does not meet the requirements of the Act.
