
THAYER'S THOUGHTS

Busy, Rush, Run, seems to be getting more common and January will be full of school winter activities. Please continue to check the website for updates to the events on scheduled times. Report cards will be mailed when we return from Christmas break. The semester grade is the average of 1st and 2nd quarter which is how a student earns credit toward graduation. One of the first questions, you may ask your child is "Are you giving your best effort?" A "C" or a "D" grade may be ok if the student is taking advantage of the opportunities provided and they really are trying. Teachers are willing to help, but students need to make an effort to receive help. If a student is part of an activity and receives help after school, the teacher will provide a note for the coach or sponsor so they are excused. School Wide Events

A system-wide event is the Statewide Writing Day. **The date is set for February 4th and 5th. Please mark your calendar—we need all students present at that time. The first day is set for students to do pre-writing. Students will have 40 minutes to develop ideas with a specific prompt. The second day is used to finalize writing. Again students will have 40 minutes. All grades will participate, however; grades 4, 8, 11 writing tests will be submitted to the state and will be scored by an independent group while the other grades plus grades 4, 8, 11 will be scored by the Hemingford faculty on the next assessment day in March.** It is great to compare how the state scoring against faculty scoring.

Dyslexia Information

Dyslexia is a learning problem characterized by difficulties with reading, spelling, writing, speaking, or listening. In many cases, dyslexia appears to be inherited. Some people believe that dyslexia is when a person reverses letters or words or reads letters backwards. Those can be symptoms of dyslexia, but it is much more complex than that.


When a person has dyslexia, there is often an unexpected difference between achievement and aptitude. However, each person with dyslexia is unique. Many students with dyslexia have talents in art, athletics, drama, or music. These special talents are often in areas that require the ability to integrate sight, spatial skills, and coordination. Often, a person with dyslexia has a problem turning language into thought (listening, reading), or turning thought into language (writing, speaking).

Students with dyslexia can be diagnosed clinically by a combination of medical history, observation and psychological testing. There is no one test that can give a definitive diagnosis. The diagnosis is made based on the results of all the data. Schools do not administer tests to diagnose dyslexia. Schools do administer academic and ability testing to see if students verify for special education services, but this is different from specific dyslexia testing.

In September, a nationally recognized dyslexia expert, Susan Barton, gave a free, three hour long, dyslexia presentation at the Alliance Library Learning Center. She discussed the classic warning signs of dyslexia, the latest brain and genetic research on dyslexia, and techniques to improve reading, writing, and spelling skills. Included in this newsletter is a handout from her presentation. Many parents have asked recently about dyslexia and how it might apply to their child in the public school setting.

If you are concerned about your child's development or progress in school, please contact your child's teacher. The classroom teacher is knowledgeable about the Nebraska state standards and how your child is progressing towards meeting those standards. If a child is having difficulty in school, a parent or teacher can refer a student to the Student Assistance Team. The SAT is a problem solving team made up of teachers and faculty. They observe in the child's classroom, identify strategies the teacher can use to better meet the child's needs, and follow-up to see which strategies have been most successful. The SAT team will also review the cumulative academic file.

If the SAT decides that a more thorough assessment of the child's strengths and weaknesses is needed, they may recommend individual testing. Written parent permission is required before this testing is begun. If you live within the Hemingford School District and have or know of a child who may benefit from special education or related services, please contact Mandy Plog, Hemingford Special Education Director, at 487-3330 for details on the referral process.



Warning Signs of Dyslexia

If a child has 3 or more of the following warning signs, encourage that child's parents and teachers to learn more about dyslexia.

In Preschool

- delayed speech
- mixing up the sounds and syllables in long words
- chronic ear infections
- severe reactions to childhood illnesses
- constant confusion of left versus right
- late establishing a dominant hand
- difficulty learning to tie shoes
- trouble memorizing their address, phone number, or the alphabet
- can't create words that rhyme
- a close relative with dyslexia

In Elementary School

- dysgraphia (slow, non-automatic handwriting that is difficult to read)
- letter or number reversals continuing past the end of first grade
- extreme difficulty learning cursive
- slow, choppy, inaccurate reading:
 - guesses based on shape or context
 - skips or misreads prepositions (at, to, of)
 - ignores suffixes
 - can't sound out unknown words
- terrible spelling
- often can't remember sight words (they, were, does) or homonyms (their, they're, and there)
- difficulty telling time with a clock with hands
- trouble with math
 - memorizing multiplication tables
 - memorizing a sequence of steps
 - directionality
- when speaking, difficulty finding the correct word
 - lots of "whatyamacallits" and "thingies"
 - common sayings come out slightly twisted
- extremely messy bedroom, backpack, and desk
- dreads going to school
 - complains of stomach aches or headaches
 - may have nightmares about school

In High School

All of the above symptoms plus:

- limited vocabulary
- extremely poor written expression
 - large discrepancy between verbal skills and written compositions
- unable to master a foreign language
- difficulty reading printed music
- poor grades in many classes
- may drop out of high school

In Adults

Education history similar to above, plus:

- slow reader
- may have to read a page 2 or 3 times to understand it
- terrible speller
- difficulty putting thoughts onto paper
 - dreads writing memos or letters
- still has difficulty with right versus left
- often gets lost, even in a familiar city
- sometimes confuses b and d, especially when tired or sick



MATH CORNER

Remember when your children were little and you would practice skip counting by 2's, 5's and 10's. Those are the numbers that the children still can count by the best. When you are traveling together maybe practice skip counting by 6's, 7's and 8's. It is a way to make those miles go by quicker as well as improving their skills.

Ask children to figure the total cost of food when the family is buying food at a concession stand or when eating out at a restaurant. They could also calculate how much change there will be after paying and what coins / bills they would expect to receive.



An easy way to review time is to ask the child to tell you what time it is. For elapsed time perhaps ask how long it would be until the family needed to leave for an activity or when traveling have them figure, "How much longer until we get there?".

EARLY MATH PRACTICE

Math for toddlers and preschoolers is all about counting! Count anything and everything! Count during everyday activities: count snack items out, count shirt buttons, or stuffed animals. Use math language. Talk about who has more or less, how many more days until something, or how many more ingredients you need to add. Have them count as they shop with you. How many kinds of cereal they find? Also help them understand what we use numbers for and point out all the places they find numbers. Children at this age struggle to comprehend how numbers and letters are different. Find places they naturally find numbers (toys, nutrition information, and street signs) and see if they can identify the numbers they find. For preschoolers and younger, the key is to get them talking, noticing, and counting. If they do that well on their way to a strong math foundation.



MATH CORNER CONT.

7th grade uses math skills to read a nutrition label

The 7th grade health class completed a unit on nutrition by looking at a nutrition label for fresh pineapple. Using their math skills they determined that 2 slices of fresh pineapple contains:

- 60 calories
- 0 grams of total fat
- 4% Recommended Daily Allowance for fiber
- 2% Recommended Daily Allowance for iron
- 25% Recommended Daily Allowance for Vitamin C



Since they determined that fresh pineapple was a healthy snack, we all shared a fresh pineapplemmmmmm Delicious!

Here's how to read a nutrition label

The nutrient information is based on a specified amount of food. Compare this to the amount you eat.

This number is the amount of the nutrient in the specified quantity of food.

How to Help Your Child Listen

Listening is half of communication. Help your child learn to be a better listener and he/she will become a more effective communicator. First, make sure your child is hearing normally. If you have any concerns about your child's ability to hear, seek professional help from an audiologist for a complete hearing evaluation.




Once your child hears adequately, the child then has to understand what he/she hears in order to respond appropriately. When children understand what they hear, they have auditory comprehension. When a child understands words and sentences, he or she has developed speech and language skills. Listening skills help a child develop friendships by participating in the normal sharing of conversational give-and-take. Good listening skills provide a child with a greater chance at success at school since students spend more time listening than doing any other activity.

When you respond to a child's speech and language efforts in a positive manner, the child is encouraged to continue to keep trying. Likewise, the child learns how to become a good listener when you model desirable behavior. Let your child know you are listening in a sincere way. You can do this by giving your full attention when the child is talking to you, looking at the child, waiting patiently for the child to finish, and then responding in a meaningful way to what the child said. You can also show good listening behavior when you sit down in a quiet room, turn off nearby radios or televisions, and devote all your attention to the conversation with your child.

Challenge your child's listening skills by interjecting a little humor. For example, ask the child how many wings a bird has, and then ask how many wings a frog has. When you ask your child questions, vary the type of question you ask to keep the child listening closely. Sometime a question seeking a one-word reply is necessary (for example, "Did you feed the dog?"). Other questions may require more listening and thinking (for example, "What did you like about dinner tonight?" "Why do we go to the grocery store?": "What would happen if your big brother tried to wear your shoes?").


You can encourage your child's good listening skills when you...

- Reduce and eliminate background noise and distractions when talking to the child
- Get the child's attention before speaking
- Talk to the child at eye level
- Speak slowly and clearly to the child, and repeat if necessary
- Reduce visual and auditory distraction in the room to help with attention and focus
- Use a consistent routine
- Respond to what the child say so he or she knows you are listening
- Use words helpful to the child as he or she remember a sequence (for example, "first," "next," "then," "finally")
- Use other cues, such as facial expressions, pointing to objects, or gestures, as needed to enhance communication.

“Shoes go on first. Then go play.” “What do you do first?”
 “If you have your shoes on, then you may go play.”)



Give your child time to think after a question

Exaggerate important words with your voice

(for example, “Time for **lunch**,” “Wear the **purple** shirt.”)

Rephrase your directions or questions

Provide a generous supply of listening experiences (for example, human voices, singing, music, animal sounds, sounds found in a park, a zoo, a city street, a backyard) and have your child tell you everything he or she hears

Give praise when the child listens well

Have an occasional reward waiting for the child when he or she listens well

Spend time every day conversing with your child in a relaxed, unhurried setting
