Expect your SAR and Award Letter

You'll receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) after you submit the FAFSA. This acknowledges that your form was processed and can be used to make corrections to your FAFSA. You'll need the PIN you used to file the FAFSA to make electronic corrections.

The colleges you listed on the FAFSA will send you a financial aid award letter detailing the assistance they're offering. They may offer a combination of scholarships, grants, work-study and student loans.

PE/Weight Training Happenings for Mr. Hiemstra



We are well into the second semester with new groups of 7th and 8th graders participating in Physical Education and our Weight Training students gearing up for Spring conditioning.

Our PE classes have adapted well to inside activity, but we'll all be ready to run outside as the weather warms up. We continue our format of 3 days of fitness and 2 activity days with our PE students. We have pre-tested in the areas of cardio vascular endurance (timed/mile run), muscular endurance (push ups), agility and quickness (shuttle run), flexibility (sit & reach), and core strength (curl ups). We will continue to emphasize these areas of fitness so we can hopefully improve our scores during our post-test which we will conduct later this Spring.

Weight training classes will begin to shift gears as we have finished our Winter sports activities. We will cycle into an 8 week session of more intense lifting 4 times a week and also utilize speed and agility work as well as plyometrics to enhance explosive power. I am a firm believer that most gains are made during the Spring and Summer months for athletes. I am pleases with our kids' work ethic and feel we will truly notice a difference athletically in our kids as we increase the intensity

Last, I would like to all of us to encourage our students to participate in Spring activities. I am probably most partial to track and field as I feel it best helps all our athletic programs, but we also offer boy's golf for those who best fit that sport. Thank you to all who have supported our programs with your efforts, kind words of encouragement, and willingness to help out wherever needed.

How To Keep Your Child's Voice Healthy

A child who yells, screams, talks in a noisy environment, or does an excessive amount of crying, laughing, singing, cheering, coughing, throat clearing, or loud talking, may be risking the health of his or her voice. These misuses or abuses of voice often cause hoarseness in children. Continuous vocal abuse may lead to swelling and thickening of the vocal folds, which in turn may lead to vocal nodules (callous-like growths on the vocal folds). The child's voice may become hoarse, breathy, or lower in pitch. Hoarseness in children may also be due to medical conditions such as allergies, sinus infections, or colds. If your child is hoarse for more than ten days but shows no other signs of allergies or upper respiratory infection, take your child to a medical doctor. If the cause is vocal abuse, voice therapy may be necessary following any medical treatment. Therapy is aimed at identifying the child's vocal behaviors that contributed to the nodules, and then reducing or eliminating them. Vocal nodules can be prevented by practicing healthy voice habits.

To help prevent voice problems, your child should...

reduce the amount of talking, especially in a noisy environment. turn down the volume on the televisions, ra dios, and computer games to create a quieter environment.

stop yelling and screaming; use nonverbal methods to get attention or to show excitement (for example, at sporting events substitute clapping or using a noisemaker for cheering; train the dog to come with a clap of the hands instead of yelling).

move close to another person before talking.

rest the voice throughout the day.

avoid using the voice to make special effects noises, as children often do when playing with toy vehicles.

stay away from cigarette smoke.

relax the muscles in the neck, face, and shoulders.

avoid excessive talking, singing, coughing, or throat clearing, especially during episodes of upper respiratory infection or allergies.

You, as parents, should...

look for evidence of straining or effortful speaking, such as neck muscles that bulge, and immediately suggest a quieter volume.

try to be a good voice model for your child,; use a calm, comfortable pitch and loudness level.

provide a healthy diet and encourage your child to drink plenty of water.

set up a calm, quiet, restful environment, especially when the child is experiencing hoarseness.

eliminate the sources of background noise so your child does not have to speak loudly to be heard.

ask the child to use the quietest voice that can still be heard without whispering.

tell your child you can only "hear" when he or she uses a quiet "indoor" voice and then respond only after he or she speaks in a quiet voice.

Program to Help Parents Become Informed about Technologies.

NORTH PLATTE, Neb Parents need to take an on-going interest in what their kids are doing online. Social networking sites have exploded on the internet in recent years. Now with the advance of technology the availability of personal electronic devices is vast. Parents need to understand the potential of online posting and be aware of the potential problems associated with them.

Don't become a parent that goes around screaming, "the sky is falling – social networking is evil." Rather take the time to become informed of the new online choices that youth have today.

The Net Smart Parent workshops have been developed by University of Nebraska – Lincoln Extension staff in the west central and panhandle districts to help parents and other interested adults become better informed. The workshops begin with a 8:30 a.m. registration and the workshop from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Locations include: March 29 – Sidney, Western Nebraska Community College; April 5 – Chadron, Chadron State College Student Center and April 12 - North Platte, North Platte Community College, south campus.

By participating, parents will be better informed to return home to interact with their 10 to 14 year olds. Parents will increase their knowledge and be able to answer such questions as; Can my child be too "social"?; Can my child safely post information online?; What is the electronic playground?; Whoever heard of RPG, or FPS, or RTS or MMORPG?

Topics will include: social networking, posting on the internet, internet gaming, keeping our digital lives safe, communicating with your child and how and where to learn more.
