FALL WRITING

The kids did their practice writing for the fall on October $17^{\text{th}} - 19^{\text{th}}$. The students are practicing the 6 traits of writing they are learning here at school. **Here are the 6 traits that we want students to model their writing after: Ideas:** The ideas are the heart of the message, the content of the piece, the main theme, together with the details that enrich and develop that theme. **Organization:** Organization is the internal structure of a piece of writing, the thread of central meaning, the logical and sometimes intriguing pattern of the ideas. Voice: The voice is the heart and soul, the magic, the will, along with the feeling and conviction of the individual writer coming out through the words. Word Choice: Word choice is the use of rich, colorful, precise language that moves and enlightens the reader. **Fluency:** Sentence fluency is the rhythm and flow of the language, the sound of work patterns, the way in which the writing plays to the ear - not just to the eye. Conventions: Conventions are the mechanical correctness of the piece - spelling, grammar and usage, paragraphing, use of capitals, and punctuation.

The teachers scored the fall writing on October 26th. These results will be shared with the kids.

MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

Mapping an Island Nation

"Becoming amateur cartographers is a lot of work, but it is fun too. We are learning lots about different kinds of maps and how to make them." These words can be heard in the Middle School Social Studies room as the students are busy discovering what it takes to become cartographers. Using latitude and longitude lines, the students were asked to identify an island that they had just discovered in one of the four major oceans. After naming the island, the students began forming a 3-D model of their imaginary island. Elevation was then painted onto the 3-D model to create an elevation map. Other types of maps the students have been busy developing are political maps, temperature or precipitation maps, and resource maps. This project will be the culmination of a 9 week study on map skills. Stop by the Middle School Social Studies room to take a look at the newly discovered islands.

6th Grade Math

Mrs. Prochazka's 6th grade math class is busy each and every morning. Most days start out with 50 in a Minute to see how many basic facts the student can correctly work in one minute. It is quickly followed by a Math 4 Today sheet that reviews previously learned concepts. Word Problems Made Easy, a program designed to help students understand and work word problems, comes shortly after. On Fridays, students try their hand at writing in Math. They are learning how to explain in detail how to work a mathematical problem. Besides all that, the students are working diligently learning how to solve division problems using whole numbers and decimals. The math class is a room full of busy and energetic learners.

Students had this to say about these programs:

"Every morning the first thing we do in Math is Math 4 Today. Math 4 Today is sort of lilke a review of what we learned in first to fifth grade. It helps the whole class to remember how to do certain problems like adding and subtracting, word problems, patterns, and graphs, etc." Nicole Schekall

"*Math 4 Today* is fun because it teaches you things you don't know how to do. I also like it because we get to go over it in math class. That way if we don't know how to do the problem we go over it." Annie Hughart

"Math 4 Today is fun and an easy A if you listen and it only takes like 5 minutes in the morning." Kayla Hanson

"Word Problems Made Easy helps us learn about normal word problems so we

understand. Mrs. Prochazka told us story problems would be our favorite, and she was right." Jesse Savala

"Writing in Math is like we are writing to a 4th grader and have to explain to them how to do a math problem. I think it makes you think about how to do the math problem yourself and makes you understand it better." Kipp Irene

Language Arts

"Can anyone pick out the prepositional phrase in this sentence? What trait are we working on when we use colorful and showing, not telling words? Can you describe the cookie so the reader can hear, taste, feel, see, and smell it?"

If you would walk into any Middle School Language Arts class, you would probably hear these questions being asked. The 5th and 6th grade students have been learning about prepositions and prepositional phrases in our grammar unit this past month. They have also been using descriptive writing skills and learning about the 6 traits of writing. One activity the students participated in was to describe a cookie that was given to them by the teacher. Using a senses chart, they filled in adjectives to describe the cookie. They then had to write a story incorporating the adjectives into the story. The stories were very creative and full of great ideas.

Math Cues for Parents

Here's a list of questions you can ask the child when they are stuck:

- 1) Is there an example in the book like this?
- 2) Do you have an example like this in your notes?
- 3) Can you do some easier problems and go back to this one after?
- 4) What part of the problem is giving you trouble?
- 5) Let's read the problem together and make sure we understand what it is asking.
- 6) Can we draw a picture of the problem? (This works well for word problems.)
- 7) Can we make up an easier problem that is similar to this? Then we can work our way up to this one.
- 8) What did your teacher say about this assignment?
- 9) Why don't we take a 10 minute break and come back to this when we aren't so frustrated.

Be positive about math!

Speech and Language of the 18-Month-Old

At age 18 months, your child...

Uses 10 to 20 different words Recognizes pictures of familiar persons and objects Starts to combine 2 words, such as "all gone", "Daddy bye-bye" Uses words to make wants known, such as "more", "up" Imitiates words and sounds more precisely Points and gestures to call attention to an event or to show wants Points to own toes, eyes, and nose Brings familiar object from another room when asked Turns pages of a book a few at a time Follows simple commands Makes a tower of 3 to 4 cubes Knows and says the names of 5 things Hums and may sing simple tunes Mixes real words with jargon, on occasion Develops a play routine Practices words and word combinations

You can stimulate your 18 month-old child's speech if you...

Read books to your child frequently

Talk simply, clearly, and slowly to your child

Enjoy many activities with your child to stimulate language,

vocabulary, and communication skills – take walks, go shopping, have a picnic, clean house, plant flowers, and talk about things as you are doing them; talk about them again later in the day.

Look at your child when he or she talks to you

Imitate and identify sounds with your child, such as barking dogs, singing birds, fire sirens, squeaky doors, running water

Describe what your child is doing, feeling, and hearing in short, 3-word sentences

Make speaking and listening experience pleasant, worthwhile, and fun for your child

Let the child listen to children's music, and book recordings

Respond to your child's attempts at communication in a meaningful way

Use age-appropriate, educational toys designed to play music or talk are beneficial for speech-language development

An added note: It is time to start thinking about Christmas gifts.

Children love toys, so look at the educational toys. They are not only fun,

but they will help with the development of your child's speech and language.
