Fall Writing—Time to practice those writing skills. Each class will be given a prompt to write which will be either a narrative, descriptive or persuasive argument. Students have one hour for the rough draft and one hour the following day to polish the piece. During the Teacher Assessment Day on October 23 (no school for kids), the full K-12 faculty will use the 6-traits method and score the student work. These results will then go back into the class-room where teachers can polish areas of need. Fall writing is scheduled for the window of October 7-8. Hopefully there will not be much illness in the building and all students are present.

ACT Prep Class

Need:

Playing cards with the face cards removed

3 people

To play:

- 1. Choose one person to be the General and two people to be the soldiers.
- 2. Evenly divide the cards and place face down in piles in front of the two soldiers.

3. Each soldier takes a card from the top of their pile and without looking at it holds it to their forehead, as if saluting the General.

4. The General calls out the sum of both cards, and the first soldier to identify his or her own card keeps both cards. So, for example, if one soldier sees the other soldier holding a 4 and hears the General say 9, the reasoning is that his or her own card must be a 5.

You could also use multiplication facts and play it the same way. 5.

FITNESSGRAM SENT HOME



The Fitnessgram, which was sent home in September, is a print out of your child's fitness scores. The fitness tests include: Mile run/walk (Aerobic capacity), Curl Ups and Push Ups (Muscle Strength and Endurance), Trunk Extension and Sit & Reach (Flexibility). These components of physical fitness are important because of their relationship to overall health and optimal function. For each of the above tests, a Healthy Fitness Zone has been identified depending

on the child's age. This is a national norm for all children of that age and means that is the score found necessary for good health and improved function. During each PE class, the students work on improving their fitness.

From 4th grade on, students receive a percent grade in physical education. The fitness test is one component of that percent grade. There is a possible 10 points for the fitness test - 2 points for each test score in the Healthy Fitness Zone. There is also a daily grade of a possible 10 points, health tests and skill tests for the total PE grade. Fitness testing is done 2-3 times a year.



LEVEL 2 SKIP'N CATS

Level 2 Skip'n Cats will have their first practice in October. Each rope skipper will be notified personally of the starting date and time. Level 1 Skip'n Cats will <u>not</u> start practice until after Christmas.

MATH CORNER

Do you have a deck of cards at home?

Try some of these math games with your child. You can play simple games to reinforce number recognition, more than and/or less than.

An easy and fun game to play is called "War". Deal all 52 cards out. Do not look at the cards. Each player turns over a card and the highest card wins. Visit <u>http://fun.familyeducation.com/games/card-games/45732.html</u> for further details.

There's always the traditional "Go Fish". Using 5 card hands, ask for specific number in your hand to match opponent. To increase the difficulty of this game, choose a number before the game starts to be the sum. Use a number in your hand and then call for the card that would complete the sum. EX. Num-

ber chosen for sum is "5". You have a three in your hand and you call for a two. 3+2=5. This can work with subtraction, multiplication, and division for upper grade levels.



If You Think Your Child Stutters



Between the ages of 2 and 6 years, almost all children will begin to repeat sounds, syllables, and whole words when they are speaking. This is not stuttering but rather normal, nonfluent duplications in speech. The amount of repetition will vary from child to child and from situation to situation. The behavior may last from several weeks to several months. It may disappear for a time and then reappear later. It may worsen when the child is tired, excited, or stressed. Eventually it will probably disappear altogether. Patient acceptance of your child's speech at this time is most important.

You can help your child during this time if you . . .

make sure your child knows he or she is loved for who he or she is give your child plenty of time to talk without interruption, and give him or her your full attention

model slow, unhurried speech, with many pauses, so your child feels relaxed

try to relieve all tensions in the home

avoid telling your child to slow down, take it easy, or repeat without stuttering

reassure your child using comments such as "Many people get stuck on words . . . it's okay," or "I know it's hard to talk sometimes; let's sit down together and talk"

try not to call attention to your child's repetitions by your facial expressions, words, or deeds

ensure that your child is getting proper rest, diet, and exercise do not interrupt the child as he or she stutters

try not to change a child's handedness

avoid finishing your child's words or sentences for him or her; don't interrupt

try not to be impatient or embarrassed by your child's speech maintain eye contact while your child is talking

try not to expect your child to be a "little adult" in everything he or she does

be calm in your discipline

avoid asking your child to "perform" for other people

enlist the help of the entire family and important people in the child's daily life

remember that short hesitations and repetitions are perfectly natural in a child's early speech and may continue for some time
