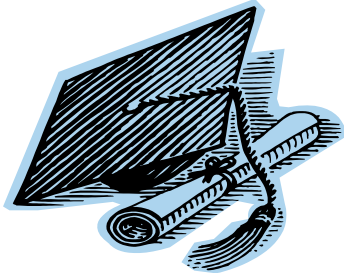

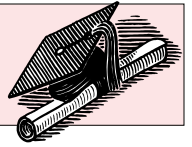

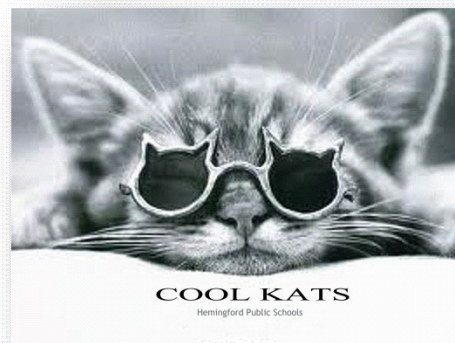
exposed to new things are also great ways to get our kids excited about learning.

Every day I am thankful for the wonderful place that we live, and for the opportunity to work with our staff and students in our outstanding school. Thank You - Mr. N



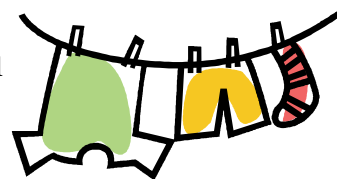

Hemingford Schools to celebrate International Bike or Walk to School Day on May 8th, 2013

Join us on May 8th to help us celebrate “Bike or Walk to School day!” Hemingford Public Schools will join schools from around the world to celebrate International Walk to School Day on May 8th, 2013.

Please meet us at the Cat Shack at 7:45 and walk or bike to school with us! Bus drivers will drop off the kids who wish to participate at 7:55. All bus drivers will need to have a permission form and notify their bus driver that they will be participating. We will leave at 8:00 am to walk or bike to school. Parents may drop their kid’s bikes off at the Cat shack on Tuesday but the Cat Shack will not be responsible for any lost or damaged bikes.

In 2011, International Walk to School Day was celebrated at more than 4,000 events at schools across the United States, along with children and adults in 40 countries around the world. We had over 100 people join us last spring and 125 last fall! Don’t be left out.

Permission forms will be sent home with elementary students. All students need to have a permission form turned in, in order to participate, (especially bus students!)

Walk to School Day events raise awareness of the need to create safer routes for walking and bicycling and emphasize the importance of issues such as increasing physical activity among children, pedestrian safety, traffic congestion and concern for the environment. The events build connections between families, schools and the broader community.

Professional Partner Program

The Professional Partner Program is a strengths-based and needs-driven model. The program is based on commitment to support normalized and inclusive options for youth with complex needs and their families. Professional Partner Program is also known in some areas as Wraparound Care.

The purpose of the Professional Partner Program is to assist families who have a child with severe emotional disturbance in accessing services for the family without having to either give up their child to become a voluntary state ward, or incur undue debt to cover such expenses. The Professional Partner Program is a partnership between the family and Professional Partner, where the parents are equal partners in all aspects of planning and care. The Professional Partner Program promotes the least intrusive, least restrictive and developmentally appropriate interventions in accordance with the needs identified by the family and within the most normalized environment.

The Professional Partner will work jointly with families to ensure appropriate assessment to develop an individualized family support plan (IFSP). The Professional Partner will assist in accessing services and supports to address the needs identified and to monitor implementations of the plan in any setting that provides for the greatest access for the youth and family.

Mission Statement

To utilize the wraparound approach to coordinate services and supports for families who have children/adolescent with a serious emotional disorder and to ensure that families have a voice, ownership and access to a comprehensive, individualized support plan.

Who is Eligible?

- ★ Youth under the age of 21
- ★ Persons who exhibits a significant degree of functional impairment due to serious emotional disturbance
- ★ Youth who are at risk of becoming a state ward
- ★ Youth at risk of being placed out of the home
- ★ Youth at risk of dropping out of school
- ★ Youth who have committed a criminal offence

What is Family Centered Practice?

Family Centered Practice is a process of empowerment. It is a life plan developed by an individualized community team of people who know the family best.

Family Centered Practice means that the family has access and ownership of the plan. The PPP works with the family in securing traditional and non-traditional care.

Examples of Service:

- Mentors to help the child with school work.
- Help a parent network with other families
- Crisis response 24 hours a day
- Adult and child mentors
- Involvement in social/recreational activities
- In-home family support
- Identifying and utilizing community supports
