

Dear Students, Parents, and Staff

Students have control over the choices they make in the cafeteria every day! The school food service staff works hard to provide appealing, nutritious foods for lunch and/or breakfast. Please make good choices.

By participating in the National School Lunch and/or Breakfast Program, our school receives reimbursement for offering meals that meet a required meal pattern. Receiving this reimbursement assists our school in keeping meal prices affordable. This meal pattern requires certain food components to be offered. These food components include: Meat/Meat Alternate, Grain items, Fruits, Vegetables and Milk. For each food component, minimum portion sizes are required though our school may offer more.

According to Federal regulations, you do not have to take all of these food components. Breakfast will consist of at least three items (excluding water) and be served beginning at 7:45 a.m. We will continue 'Grab N Go' this year or regular breakfast line for 7TH through 12th grades.

Grab N Go may be eaten in the Red Zone or in the cafeteria if time allows. Elementary students will eat in the cafeteria.

For lunch one must choose at least 3 components, with at least one of these being a fruit or vegetable. OUR POINT OF SERVE Staff will make sure the meal qualifies for reimbursement. This serving option is known as OFFER VERSES SERVE. The school food service offers all five components, but can serve fewer. This allows the student to decline foods they don't intend to eat. It will cut down on food waste and cost.

JR. high and High School Students may forgo the main entrée but will be asked to order a premade chef salad at lunch count. It will contain three components required for a qualified lunch.

The staff person who checks your tray at the end of the serving line is required to see that it contains at least three of the five food components with one component being a 1/2 cup serving

fruit or vegetable or a combination of the two. If you do not have all of the food components needed, you may be asked to go back and get something else.

Choosing three, four or five food components has no effect on the price you pay for lunch. A student is only charged extra if he asks for a second main entrée or gets an extra milk. Our Fruit and Vegetable Bar will be a variety of fresh and canned. The entire meal is the best value for your money. You can help keep the lunch line moving quickly by checking the menu ahead of time and politely telling the servers which foods you do not want. Remember the choice is yours! Turning down foods you will not eat instead of throwing them in the trash is a responsible way to help your school save food, time and money.

This year we will have 'Grab N' Go' after school for high school only from 3:45-4:00 you may go through the cafeteria and purchase nutritious snack to get you through sports practice. Items may include bananas, fruit cups, jerky sticks, granola bars, or PBJ's. It will be a cash deal at .50 per item purchased. We are hoping this will benefit out sports students.

State Mandated that we are not allowed to put treats, homemade desserts or outside purchased items in our cafeteria coolers or freezers. We will be putting a refrigerator for those items in the Elementary building.

Milk is highly recommended but water will be available at lunch time. Limit 2. Water fountains are found throughout the school.





Table time

Eating together can build family bonds and inspire your youngster to eat healthier foods. Use these ideas to plan regular meals that he will look forward to.

Make it a habit

Sharing meals as often as possible will get everyone in the routine. Set times that work for your family. That may mean you have a late dinner after soccer practice one evening and an early breakfast before work and school on another morning.

Involve your child

Your youngster will be more interested in eating the meal if he helps to prepare it. He might make a healthy dish like fruit salad. He could also set the table and fill water glasses. *Idea*: Let him create place mats by cutting pictures of

nutritious foods from old magazines and gluing them on construction paper.

Add excitement

Turn the table into a playful place with special-event meals. You might have a "silly hat dinner" (everyone wears a hat that they made or decorated). Use the hats to spark conversation. ("What a great hat. How did you think of it?") Or have each person pick a storybook character and pretend to be that character throughout the meal.

Turn off the screens, turn on the fun

Boost your child's physical activity by setting limits on screen time and encouraging her to play outside instead. Try these strategies.

- **Establish rules.** Tell her when she can and can't have screen time. For example, on school days, you might allow it only after outdoor play, homework, and dinner.
- **Provide inspiration.** Have your youngster fill a basket with active toys like a jump rope, balls, a bat, and a Frisbee. Then, place the basket near the door so it's easy to grab equipment on her way outside.
- **Plan ahead.** Let her make outdoor plans with friends. She could organize a weekly game of kickball or hide-and-seek, for instance. ●



Waste not, want not

Did you know that nearly onethird of the world's food ends up in the trash? Your family can avoid wasting perfectly good food—plus save money and help the environment with these tips.

Stick to a list. Reducing food waste starts with buying only what you need. Ask your child to help you plan a week's



worth of healthy meals and make a grocery list. Go shopping together, and get only what's on the list.

Take what you'll eat. Encourage your youngster to put on her plate only what she'll eat. Here's a good strategy: She should serve herself less than she thinks she wants—then she could get seconds if she's still hungry.

Store leftovers wisely. Have your child

label containers of leftovers with dates and contents. Keep fresh foods with older dates in the front of the refrigerator so you won't forget about them. If you won't use leftovers quickly, move them to the freezer.

A30 Handling food allergies at school

Q: My daughter is allergic to eggs, and she's starting school this year. What steps should I take to help her stay safe?

A: Begin by talking to your daughter's teacher, the cafeteria manager, and the school nurse. They'll explain the policies for protecting students with allergies, such as how your child can choose safe foods in the cafeteria.



At the same time, help your daughter learn to take responsibility for managing her allergy. For example, she should only eat her own food and not accept food from other students. Explain that she can't eat homemade goods, such as birthday cupcakes, since there's no way to be certain they're egg-free.

Finally, make sure she knows the symptoms of a reaction, and tell her to get adult help immediately if she notices any or if she thinks she was exposed to eggs.





Hemingford Public School Superintendent Charles Isom Proposed School Expansion Project

There is never a good time...

When I interviewed at Hemingford, some of the interview was focused on the need for more space at the school. This is not an overnight surprise; this addition has been in the planning stages for years and the need for rooms is greater than ever.

There is nothing wrong with the facilities we have that we use for the PK-4 and 7-12 classes for the most part. The modulars were a temporary fix that have been very functional. The modulars were never a final solution. The modulars as well as the Ag shop and gym create some safety concerns. The ability to confine kids in today's environment helps with many aspects of safety. Keeping kids in the building during inclement weather is another feature of getting all buildings joined.

The plans include an addition of eight rooms to the elementary building, which include rooms for the fifth and sixth grade along with a specialty room so that we can recapture space in the library. Also included in the plans are moving the kindergarten rooms to the new addition because they would be better designed for the curriculum needs. ADA is a huge aspect of education and allowing all students to learn in an environment that is accessible to all students is critical, so the addition will include an elevator along with stairs. There is an ongoing discussion happening of what this all will look like.

In the high school there are plans to add an additional four classrooms, a high school principal –secretary area along with a commons area. The idea is also out there for adding a Vocational Agriculture space and a gym/stage area. Currently with the space we have, our Spanish class takes place in the high school library, so we need to designate a classroom for that, as well as a larger art room since our Art program has opened up to the K-12 student population.

We have teamed with Lee Davies Architect, BD Construction-Construction Management and DA Davidson-Bond underwriter to help us with this process.

Please watch for community meetings that will be planned. We are in the process of getting the plans finalized. If you have questions, please feel free to contact Mr. Isom at the school.
