End of the Semester—January 13th

Semester Grades



The semester grade is the average of 1st and 2nd quarter which is how a student earns credit toward graduation. One of the first questions, you may ask your child is "Are you giving your best effort?" or "Was there something more you could have done to improve your grade?" If the semester grade is below 70%, no credit is issued and students will have to retake the class. Teachers are willing to help, but students need to make an effort to receive help. There is always room in SST.

Honor Roll

The honor roll includes grades 4-12 for the 2nd Quarter and 1st Semester. It will be published in the newspaper as well as the next newsletter. The Distinguished List will include the names of those students who have earned all "A's". The Honor List will include the names of those students who have all "A's" and "B's" and have earned an average of 90% and above.



Why is HANDWASHING so important?

First Line of Defense Against Germs

Germs can spread many ways, including:

- touching dirty hands
- changing dirty diapers
- through contaminated water and food
- through droplets in the air released during a cough or sneeze
- on contaminated surfaces
- through contact with a sick person's body fluids

When kids come into contact with germs, they can unknowingly become infected simply by touching their eyes, nose, or mouth. And once they're infected, it's usually just a matter of time before the whole family comes down with the same illness.

Good hand washing is the first line of defense against the spread of many illnesses — from the common cold to more serious infections, such as [meningitis](#), [bronchiolitis](#), [the flu](#), [hepatitis A](#), and most types of infectious [diarrhea](#).

Washing Hands Correctly

Here's how to scrub those germs away. Teach this routine to your kids — or better yet, wash your hands together often so they learn how important this good habit is:

1. Wash your hands in warm water. Make sure the water isn't too hot for little hands.
2. Use soap and lather up for about 20 seconds (antibacterial soap isn't necessary — any soap will do). Make sure you get in between the fingers and under the nails where germs like to hang out. And don't forget the wrists!
3. Rinse and dry well with a clean towel

To minimize the germs passed around your family, make regular hand washing a rule for everyone, especially:

- before eating and cooking
- after using the bathroom

- after cleaning around the house
- after touching animals, including family pets
- before and after visiting or taking care of any sick friends or relatives
- after blowing one's nose, coughing, or sneezing
- after being outside (playing, gardening, walking the dog, etc.)

Don't underestimate the power of hand washing! The few seconds you spend at the sink could save you trips to the doctor's office.

Why is PERSONAL HYGEINE so important?

As children approach puberty they will experience many changes within their bodies. At puberty, sweat glands start to produce more secretions. When these secretions are exposed to air and moisture they produce body odors. **Children can tease each other or even bully other children because of body odor or their personal hygiene practices.**

Encourage your children to follow these steps to help them feel clean and fresh:

- Have regular showers or baths with soap to help get rid of the dirt and oil on their skin and reduce the bacteria that can lead to body odor. Encourage the use of antiperspirants as well.
- Clothes can absorb body odor as well – ensure that your child's clothes are washed regularly and wear clean clothes daily.
- Ensure shoes are not worn without socks and change socks daily.
- Send a change of clothes for your children to change into after gym class if needed.
- Brush and floss daily for oral hygiene. Children's teeth should be brushed for a minimum of two minutes at least twice a day (in the morning and in the evening before bedtime).




Hemingford Local Science Fair
