On August 26th, students in grades 5-12 had the opportunity to hear from Dr. Mark Adler, who courageously shared the story of his son, Reid, whose life was tragically lost to suicide after experiencing cyberbullying and intimidation.

Dr. Adler's message was heartfelt, challenging, and deeply moving. He urged our students to stand up for one another, to reject bullying, and to seek out trusted adults when they or someone else is in need. His presentation centered on building positive relationships, developing grit and hope, and using courage and leadership to spread kindness in every interaction.

As we move further into the school year and the pace of classes, activities, and events picks up, I hope we'll each pause to reflect on how we can personally contribute to a culture of kindness and hope, not only in our schools but throughout the entire Hemingford community.

Kindness doesn't always require grand gestures. More often, it's the simple, everyday action like a friendly greeting, a sincere compliment, or an encouraging word that makes an impact. These moments can brighten someone's day, change their perspective, and make them feel seen and valued. I encourage students, staff, families, and community members to join together in spreading that kind of kindness every day.

A few years ago, I came across an expanded reflection on what kindness can look like in action:

- Kindness Encourages
- Kindness Includes
- Kindness Trusts
- Kindness Celebrates

I hope we can collectively commit to being a school and community that encourages one another, includes everyone, builds trust, and celebrates each other's efforts and achievements. When we do these things, our students (and adults) grow stronger together.

HIGH SCHOOL UPDATES

Dear Families,

The school year is off to a great start and everyone seems to be settling into the school routine. As I'm sure most of your students have already made you aware, we have had some changes to our cell phone policies as mandated by state statute. Here is a quick summary:

- Phones and other personal electronic devices are to be off and out of sight during the day.
- Phones can be used during lunch and before and after school.
- If contact with a student is needed during school hours, parents are instructed to call the office.

We would appreciate your support in not contacting your student via their cell phone during the school day, except over the lunch hour. 
- How can I help?

If you do not want your child to be screened for hearing, vision, or dental screenings, please send me a statement signed by a physician, physician assistant, or nurse practitioner that states your child underwent the required screening within the past 6 months prior to screening day.

If you do not want your child to be screened for height and/or weight measurement, please send me a statement of objection signed and dated by the parent/guardian prior to screening day.



Our world needs more Kindness! That's why Kindness is how we are starting the school year. Our definition of Kindness is acting with understanding, generosity, and care. You'll hear a lot about Kindness this year because it is also 1 of our 3 outcomes:

- Be Kind: Teaching social skills like listening, friendship, solving conflicts, and leadership. These skills are taught alongside Empathy, Respect, & Cooperation
- Be Strong: Skills that help students focus, stay organized, and set goals. These skills are taught alongside Responsibility, Courage, & Perseverance
- Be Well: Skills that help students handle their emotions and deal with stress. These skills are taught alongside Gratitude, Honesty, & Creativity









PurposeFull Pursuits

Each month, we'll send PurposeFull Pursuits to provide fun challenges you can pursue together! These are simple ways to intentionally reinforce the skills we are working on at school, while providing fun strategies to grow together as a family. We invite you to make some memories and join in the fun!

Pursuit #1

Review Kindness as a family! Remember that Kindness is acting with understanding, generosity, and care. Schedule a family movie night so that you can specifically watch for different ways people show Kindness. Let everybody know that you'd like them to point out examples of how the characters show Kindness as you watch the movie. Be sure to pause periodically to discuss the examples of Kindness you see. You could also talk about missed opportunities for Kindness and what you might have done differently!

Family Connection

Overview

To help students achieve their best and make schools safe and welcoming, we need more than just anti-bullying policies. CharacterStrong uses strategies that are proven to work and focus on key social and emotional skills. In the curriculum, students will experience a blend of anti-bullying methods with other important skills like empathy, communication, and resilience. This helps schools deal with bullying better while also teaching students to understand and care for each other. This approach makes it easier for schools to embrace bullying prevention strategies and build an environment of kindness and respect.



Look Up to Gain Digital Platform Health, Safety, & Wisdom

Digital media platforms have continued to impact youth mental health negatively. Media-based companies utilize algorithms and artificial intelligence (AI) to collect personal data and program behavioral outcomes in youth. These moneydriven digital companies intend to keep a child's attention on their platform with no regard to how it is harming them. Understanding how deepfakes, AI, misinformation, and emotional exploitation are occurring online is the first step toward becoming a more informed digital consumer. Teens who learn to look up from their phones gain digital health, safety, and wisdom.

Jay Martin is the School Safety & Security Director with the Nebraska Department of Education. He returned to his home state of Nebraska after spending 24 years in Colorado and retiring from his career in law enforcement. He developed partnerships with the National Association of School Resource Officers (NASRO), the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) task force, human trafficking task forces, movie producers, authors, and psychologists, and has ghostwritten on digital best practices. Additionally, during his tenure, he taught in Omaha Public Schools and other districts in Nebraska & Colorado. His career has been committed to educating school communities in developing a better culture and climate with youth.



INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND **GUARDIANS**

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an allhazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol.

The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the following actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and Shelter.

HOLD

"In Your Classroom or Area"

Students are trained to:

- Clear the hallways and remain in their area or room until the "All Clear" is announced
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Close and lock the door
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual

SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"

Students are trained to:

- Return to inside of building
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring everyone indoors
- Lock the outside doors
- Increase situational awareness
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual





LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door



PARENT GUIDANCE

In the event of a live incident, parents may have questions about their role.

SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"



Secure is called when there is something dangerous outside of the building. Students and staff are brought into the building and the outside doors will be locked. The school might display the Building is Secured poster on entry doors or nearby windows. Inside, it will be business as usual.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.



WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well.

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unscheduled drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That's called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.



It's important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the "Muscle Memory" associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.

CAN PARENTS OBSERVE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE DRILLS?

The school welcomes parents who wish to observe or participate in drills.

HOW IT WORKS

Students should provide homework for which they wish to receive help or topics that they would like to cover.






OUR PARTNERS

The Nebraska Department of Education has awarded a grant to the Nebraska State Colleges to develop a program that provides free online tutoring to K-12 students in rural Nebraska.




OUR TUTORS
