FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S STANDPOINT DECEMBER 2025

This fall, Hemingford Public Schools had the opportunity to participate in an external review process as part of the statewide accreditation requirements for Nebraska schools. Every public school in Nebraska undergoes this type of review at least once every five years to ensure continuous improvement and alignment with statewide expectations.

On October 28th and 29th, we welcomed a team of educators from across the state who visited our district as part of the accreditation review. During their two-day visit, team members engaged in interviews with staff, students, and community stakeholders, observed classrooms and school operations, and carefully reviewed key documents, including our vision, mission, and school improvement goals.

Following the visit, the team provided a detailed report summarizing their observations and findings. This full report is now available to the public at the following link: <u>Hemingford External Report 2025</u>

If you're looking for a quick summary, here are the commendations and recommendations highlighted by the review team:

Commendation #1: The School Improvement Team has taken intentional and actionable steps over the past three years, resulting in foundational district-wide improvement.

Commendation #2: The district demonstrates a strong sense of connection, purpose, and community pride, emphasizing that living out their mission is an everyday commitment, not a long-term slogan.

Commendation #3: The district leadership has made strategic decisions to strengthen and sustain district resources.

Recommendation #1: Strengthen, deepen, and sustain the implementation of evidence-based practices tied to current goals.

Recommendation: #2: Strengthen MTSS processes and systems by refining data collection, progress monitoring, and intervention practices to improve student outcomes and system-wide consistency.

This feedback reflects the dedication of our entire school community to ensuring that Hemingford Public Schools remains a place of high expectations, strong relationships, and continuous improvement.




ELEMENTARY EXCERPTS



The Bobcat CARE (Community Action Reaching Education) Fund

How it Works

Donations, whether items or funds, can be dropped off at the school and will be distributed to the students in need. This program is entirely confidential, and no student names are ever disclosed.

2025 Hemingford High School Football Recap

We finished the 2025 football season with a season record of 9-2, district record of 4-1, and JV record of 3-0. We earned a spot in the Nebraska Class D1 State Football Playoffs, defeating East Butler and Stanton in rounds one and two. As one of only eight remaining teams in class D1, we lost to Crofton in the quarterfinals. Competitively, it's always a goal of our program to make a "deep" playoff run, so we were pumped that we returned to the quarterfinals for the first time since 2014.

Making it to the quarterfinals did not happen randomly. We had a strong group of leaders that were determined to do things together to get stronger, to get faster, to get more athletic, and to ultimately become more committed to one another. INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND **GUARDIANS**

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an allhazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol.

The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the following actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and Shelter.

HOLD

"In Your Classroom or Area"

Students are trained to:

- Clear the hallways and remain in their area or room until the "All Clear" is announced
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Close and lock the door
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual

SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"

Students are trained to:

- Return to inside of building
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring everyone indoors
- Lock the outside doors
- Increase situational awareness
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual





LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

Students are trained to:

- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Recover students from hallway if possible
- Lock the classroom door
- Turn out the lights
- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door
- Prepare to evade or defend

EVACUATE

"To a Location"

Students are trained to:

- Leave stuff behind if required to
- If possible, bring their phone
- Follow instructions

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring roll sheet and Go Bag (unless instructed not to bring anything with them, dependent on reason for evacuation.)
- Lead students to Evacuation location
- Account for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.

SHELTER

"State Hazard and Safety Strategy"

Hazards might include:

- Tornado
- Hazmat
- Earthquake
- Tsunami

Safety Strategies might include:

- Evacuate to shelter area
- Seal the room
- Drop, cover and hold
- Get to high ground

Students are trained in:

Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies

Adults and staff are trained in:

- Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies
- Accounting for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.







PARENT GUIDANCE

In the event of a live incident, parents may have questions about their role.

SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"



Secure is called when there is something dangerous outside of the building. Students and staff are brought into the building and the outside doors will be locked. The school might display the Building is Secured poster on entry doors or nearby windows. Inside, it will be business as usual.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.



WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well.

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unscheduled drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That's called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.



It's important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the "Muscle Memory" associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.


