DISTRICT COMMUNICATION UPDATE

This last year, Remind was purchased by ParentSquare and will be absorbed into their company. We took this opportunity to explore other messaging systems and ultimately chose a PowerSchool-based service called SchoolMessenger. This summer, we'll be working on setting up and testing the service. Once functional, you'll be able to receive district messages through email, a phone call, or SMS (Text Messaging). To use SMS, you'll need to opt in to that service. This campaign will start later this summer.

Also, the PowerSchool app and PowerSchool website will have a different, more modern look to them. Students and parents will also have the ability to message teachers right in the PowerSchool app.

We do not have an exact date for when SchoolMessenger will be active, but be on the lookout for more information as the summer progresses.

The Bobcat CARE (Community Action Reaching Education) Fund

2026 Hemingford Track & Field Recap

We're wrapping up the track and field season with 29 HS athletes and 46 JH athletes. The HS girls finished 7th in WTC and 3rd in PAC. The HS boys finished 1st in WTC and 1st in PAC. Back to back in WTC and in the PAC that is now the 4th time in a row as champions for the boys. The JH girls finished 3rd in WTC and 2nd in PAC. The JH boys finished 1st in WTC and 1st in PAC. At the HS level, there were over 180 personal season records set this season. Three HS athletes competed at the HS State T&F Championships and four JH athletes competed at the JH State T&F Championships.

HS State Championship Competitors (as of writing article, results not yet known)

Austin Benda - 1600m, 3200m

Eli Hunter - Pole Vault

Jayce Haas - 100m, 200m

A quick note on these three HS State Championship Competitors...they all are doing/have done extra things to increase their chances of competing at a high level. Some of those extra things get noticed, some do not. Other student-athletes are doing extra things as well, but may have not qualified for the State Meet, and I would encourage those individuals to stay hungry, stay patient, and continue to Grow, Compete, and remain Positive. Also, latch on to those competitors that are doing "extra"ordinary things. One of my favorite quotes, "Sit with WARRIORS - the conversation is different."

Austin Benda - this competitor puts on miles and miles of running on his own time, and not just leisurely miles, they are miles that have a purpose and a time, he is in tune with how the benefits of sleep and nutrition also affect his running performance.

Eli Hunter - in addition to practicing pole vault at practice, this competitor has invested his own time in additional pole vault repetitions over the weekend.

Jayce Haas - this competitor has invested his time in attending speed and T&F camps in the past, he is repeatedly noted as one of the top lifters in the weight room during the summer and throughout the school year, he is methodical during daily speed habits and mentally locks into why he is doing things instead of racing through things to just finish them.

The purpose of this message about these athletes is not to say they are perfect or that others aren't doing extra things, that's not the message...instead I believe some of the habits they are establishing can be inspirational to others. It is also to show that they didn't "luck" into competing at the State Meet. For all athletes that have a desire to compete at a high level, understand you must invest in things beyond going through the motions, beyond saying "here" for attendance...have big goals and dreams, say them out loud to your coaches and parents, and don't be afraid of coaches and parents that are holding you accountable to reaching your goals. You will get to a point where you want to quit, but I would challenge you to lean on your support system to push through. We are here to say to you, "It's going to be hard, there are no short-cuts, you can do it, we're here to support you!" Our T&F Program and many of our sports programs here at the school during the school year and during the summer are opportunities for you to do something "extra"ordinary. Don't be afraid of new, don't back away from uncomfortable or things you aren't good at (yet), lean into seeking safe, but hard things to challenge yourselves...ask these athletes if the hard things and sacrifices they made were worth the opportunity to compete at the State Meet?

STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an all-hazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol.

The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the following actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and Shelter.

HOLD

"In Your Classroom or Area"

Students are trained to:

- Clear the hallways and remain in their area or room until the "All Clear" is announced
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Close and lock the door
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"

STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

PARENT GUIDANCE

In the event of a live incident, parents may have questions about their role.

SECURE

“Get Inside. Lock outside doors”



Secure is called when there is something dangerous outside of the building. Students and staff are brought into the building and the outside doors will be locked. The school might display the Building is Secured poster on entry doors or nearby windows. Inside, it will be business as usual.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.

WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN

“Locks, Lights, Out of Sight”



A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well.

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unscheduled drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That’s called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.

It’s important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the “Muscle Memory” associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.

CAN PARENTS OBSERVE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE DRILLS?

The school welcomes parents who wish to observe or participate in drills.

What Is Early Development Network Services Coordination?



Services Coordination means a central contact person, known as the services coordinator, is assigned to each family. Services Coordination helps families of children with special needs below age three:

- ✓ Find services to meet developmental, educational, financial, health care, child care, respite care, and other needs;
- ✓ Link with needed services;
- ✓ Work with multiple providers to make sure services are provided as needed; and
- ✓ Become coordinators of services for their own children in the future.

Services Coordination Activities

- ✓ Assisting parents of eligible children in obtaining access to needed early intervention services and other services identified in the Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP);
- ✓ Making referrals to providers for needed services and scheduling appointments for eligible children and their families;
- ✓ Coordinating early intervention services and other services (such as educational, social, and medical services) for eligible children;
- ✓ Coordinating screenings (if applicable), evaluations, and assessments;
- ✓ Facilitating and participating in the development, review, and evaluation of IFSPs;
- ✓ Coordinating, facilitating, and monitoring the delivery of services to ensure that the services are provided in a timely manner;
- ✓ Informing families of their rights and procedural safeguards; and
- ✓ Facilitating the development of a transition plan to preschool or other services, if appropriate.

Who Is Eligible for Services Coordination?

Eligible families are those who have an infant or toddler below age three who qualifies for services because of a disability or developmental delay.

Year-round services coordination is provided. There is no cost to families.

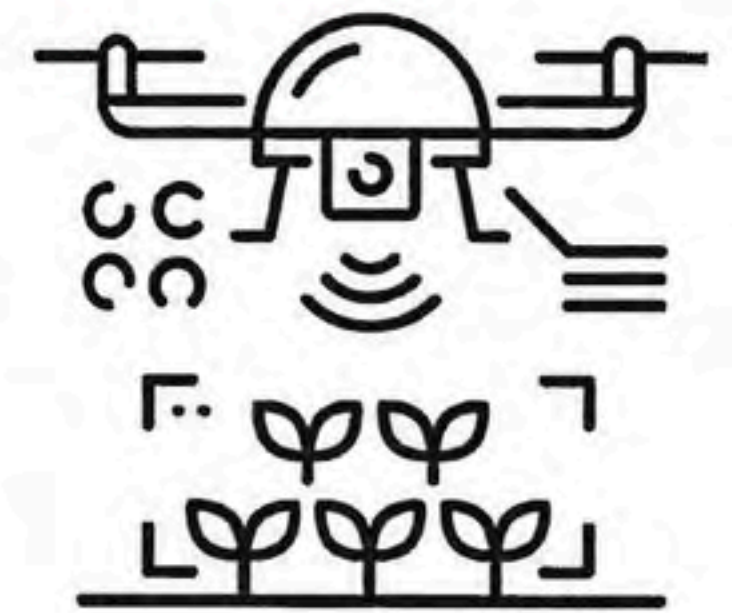
